Volunteers Play a Vital Role

As you all know, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks are steeped in traditions. From our ritual ceremony to meeting agendas and beyond, tradition plays a huge role in who we are. None of those traditions are more highly regarded than being a volunteer. For most lodges around the country, volunteers operate them. They cook, clean, bartend and do pretty much all of the A to Z's for their lodge. It is how many of them stay open.

Of course, the Elks do not have a corner on the market of volunteerism. Dating all the way back to the 1700s, volunteerism has been a major part of our country. According to some, it all started with the forming of a volunteer fire department in 1736 in Philadelphia by none-other than Benjamin Franklin. Today, almost 70% of our firefighters are in volunteer departments.

Initially, volunteering was more faith-based volunteering, and eventually became more of a patriotic effort during the Revolutionary War. Those who could not get on the battlefield helped at home by boycotting British goods and raising funds to support their cause.

In the 1800s things really took off in an effort to unite communities, spurring volunteers to get involved. Out of this era came organizations like the YMCA, United Way and of course, the American Red Cross, founded by Clara Barton. She was a nurse who had volunteered during the civil war. Other more politically connected organizations sprung up during the 1800s with introduction of the abolitionist movement forming, with the likes of Harriet Beecher Stowe, Frederick Douglas and Sojourner Truth working to end slavery.

The 1900s saw even more growth with volunteering efforts being supported by religious, corporate, community and political roots. This resulted in a wide variety of and affected us across the country. The civil rights movement was born out of this, and college campuses were also deeply involved. It also spread beyond our borders with the formation of the Peace Corps in the 1960s.

More recently in the 2000s we saw a more patriotic resurgence after September 11, 2001. Regardless though, whatever century, decade or year, the Elks have always been there. We began as volunteers, helping form the first ever mobile army surgical hospital, the great Johnstown flood in Pennsylvania in 1889, the Elks Lodge members in San Francisco were the first responders to the earthquake in 1906. There are many other examples if you look at our history of when we stepped up to help those in need.

That attitude and effort continues today, and our lodge can proudly say we are an active role model for our own community. We have provided meals for homeless and veterans, school supplies and backpacks for underprivileged children, delivered drug awareness information to schools, been sponsors and attended the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life and so much more.

Yes, our lodge has the luxury of having staff to cook, clean and serve, but we also can be proud of our volunteerism in our community. So, if you have not yet, pick out a committee here at the lodge and get involved. Volunteers donate three things, their time, their money, or goods. It only takes an hour of your time, a dollar here or there or whatever goods you can donate to the cause. Once you get involved at whatever level it may be, you will reap more than you sow, knowing you've given to your community and those in need. Who knows, your heart might be touched in a way you never knew it could.





The Elks During the Great War

One of the chief aims of the Order of Elks has been not only to keep alive in the hearts of its own members a realization of the obligations of American citizenship, but also to quicken the spirit of true patriotism. It was natural, therefore, when our country en-

tered World War I, the Elks were eager to render service.

After conferences with federal authorities as to the manner in which the resources of the order might be most effectively employed, the Grand Lodge appropriated one million dollars


Elks unanimously approved a resolution appropriating one million dollars for the "War Relief Fund". These funds helped the Commission organize and equip the first two base hospitals to reach France.

to a special war relief fund.

The most pressing need, as well as the most humanely appealing, was the adequate care of the sick and wounded fighting men overseas. Therefore, the first activity of the commission was to finance and provide the

sion was to finance and provide the complete equipment for two base hospitals. These were the first base hospital units to reach the battle area in France where they both rendered notably distinguished service throughout the War.

The ever-increasing numbers of the maimed and wounded of our forces who were brought back home soon overtaxed the then available hospital and created a pressing need for additional



facilities. After securing the approval of the government, the commission promptly constructed and equipped a reconstruction hospital of with a 700 bed capacity in Boston, Massachusetts.

Dedicated and turned over to the government on November 16, 1918, it was the first of such hospitals to be established in the United States. It was operated to its full capacity for several years, until the need for it passed in 1921.

During the summer of 1918 the need became apparent for a

community house at Camp Sherman, Ohio. in which the families of the forty thousand soldiers stationed there might be cared for during their visits there. The commission met this need by erecting a 72-room structure which effectively served its purpose, particularly during the great flu epidemic.

In the meantime, the Salvation

Army was performing a wonderful service among our soldiers in France, but it was severely handicapped by lack of funds. To assist in meeting this exigency and to insure the continuance of this service, the War Relief Commission and Elks Lodges all over the country fostered the campaigns of the Army for the needed funds, in many instances assuming the entire cost of such campaigns.

"The Salvation Army can never forget, or get away from, it's deep sense of indebtedness and gratitude to the grand body of men that is before me this morning," said the commander of the Salvation Army, "I say without hesitancy that our organization could not have achieved it's exceptional success in this war, but for the splendid, practical tangible aid that was rendered to us by the Elks."

It is worthy of note, that the Elks was the first fraternal organization whose aid was sought in the movement for food conservation during the War. Perhaps the most distinctive and most helpful service by the Order in war relief work was in connection with the

vocational training of our disabled soldiers, a field it had entirely to itself when this work was begun, in accredited association with the Federal Board of Vocational Education.

During this period of training, and in preparation thereof, many of the veterans were in

dire need of financial assistance. Realizing that loans to them would be preferable to charitable gifts, the commission created a revolving fund from which such loans could be made, the repayment becoming available for other similar loans. Nearly forty thousand such loans were made. And it's interesting to note that every dollar was repaid, except in a few cases where death, or other intervening cause, made it impossible. In the course of a speech delivered before the House of Representatives commending highly the over all war work of our Order, a congress-

man from the State of New York made the following statement regarding the revolving fund: "This great order seemed to sense with prophetic vision the frightful consequences of war and proceeded to set in motion and bring to successful fruition or achievement through it's Elks War Relief Commission a service most essential and timely, which had not been anticipated or performed by any other agency." He quoted, further,

these words from another speech delivered before the House by a Congressman from the state of Washington: "The Elks Fund thus provided is the first instance of the kind in the history of the country where a great patriotic fraternal organization has come to the aid of the government in so timely, helpful and substantial a manner."

This unique service, thus performed by the Order, was so conspicuously effective that the government eventually followed the Order's example, and created a similar revolving fund, and took over this particular activity. The patriotic services performed by the Order of Elks during World War I, particularly in the administration of its war relief fund, have been subjects of numerous expressions of praise and appreciation. This is just another example of how Elks throughout history share and care.








