


Hello Elk family. It's November, the precursor to the big holiday season. Around Thanksgiving time we begin to come

# November is Veterans Remembrance Month

he month of November is well known for a few reasons. It's the month before December and the holidays, we celebrate Thanksgiving and before that, we celebrate Veterans Day. In fact, for the Elks, November is Veterans Remembrance Month!

Every year on November 11 we celebrate and honor the men and women who have served our country. It started with the end of World War I, the war to end all wars when Germany signed an armistice agreement with Allies.

When fighting ceased in November 1918, President Woodrow Wilson gave General John Pershing, American Expeditionary Force Commander of WWI and lifelong Elk, the honor of setting the exact moment that the Armistice would forever be marked. Pershing selected the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month – his personal tribute to the memory of those soldiers, "Elks and non-Elks alike," who had fallen. General Pershing then took a victory tour of the nation and even stopped by what is today's McMe-namins Elks Temple in 1920.

The hour of 11 p.m. has long

held significance to the Elks. The 11th hour observance was originally a remembrance of the Battle of Hastings, which took place in the year 1066 A.D. Why is that? Be-



In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

cause Englishman Charles Vivian, founder of the Jolly Corks which later became the Elks, simply borrowed most of the traditions and rituals from the Royal and Antedeluvian Order of Buffaloes, a fraternal organization to which he belonged that had started in England around 1010 A.D.

To this day, at any evening Elks event, all activity ceases, members and guests rise, the chimes ring 11 times and the Eleven O'Clock Toast is recited: You have heard the tolling of 11 strokes. This is to remind us that with Elks, the hour of 11 has a tender significance. Wherever Elks may roam, whatever their lot in life may be, when this hour falls upon the dial of night, the great heart of Elkdom swells and throbs. It is the golden hour of recollection, the homecoming of those who wander, the mystic roll call of those who will come no more. Living or dead, Elks are never forgotten, never forsaken.

Morning and noon may pass them by, the light of day sink heedlessly in the West, but ere the shadows of midnight shall fall, the chimes of memory will be pealing forth the friendly message, "To our absent members."

Originally it was called Armistice Day because it was hoped that there would be no more wars or conflicts like World War I. We all know it didn't last because we later fought in World War II, Korea, Vietnam and, more recently, in the middle east.

There was some confusion and differing opinions on leaving the name Armistice and changing it to Veterans Day. Over the years it has been called both with some states celebrating on November 11 and others celebrating on the fourth Monday of October which was the initial idea from Congress. At one point, four holidays were announced with them all to be celebrated on a Monday, which included Veterans Day.

The idea was that these threeday weekends would encourage Americans to travel or spend additional time together with family or friends. The first known celebration of "Veterans Day" was in 1947 in Birmingham, Alabama. A World War II veteran organized a parade and festivities to honor all veterans. Seven years later, Congress passed, and President Eisenhower signed, a bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day. That parade in Birmingham started what has become a nationwide day of celebrating our veterans.

Even though we also celebrate Memorial Day for our veterans who died in combat or because of it, Veterans Day is for remembering and honoring all veterans, living or dead. This is why every year at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, there

is a special tribute performed.

Other countries also have their version of Veterans Day. In Great Britain, Canada, and Australia it's called Remembrance Day. Canada is more like ours in that we are mainly focused on those veterans still living. They wear red poppies to honor their war dead on November 11, while here in the US poppies are the symbol of Memorial Day. In Australia and Great Britain, Remembrance Day is more like our Memorial Day with Great Britain observing a two-minute moment of silence to honor those who died in war.

The Elks have a motto, "As long as there are veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them." The Elks have a long history of service to our veterans. In 1917, the Elks established a War Relief Fund to care for the sick and wounded on the battlefields of France. Elks also organized and equiped the first two base hospitals in France. In 1918, the Elks built a 700 bed hospital in Boston and donated it to the federal government, creating the precursor to today's VA Medical Centers. Between 1918 and 1924, Elks made 40,000 rehabilitation, vocational and educational loans to veterans with disabilities, a program so successful it inspires the government to establish the GI Bill. In 1946, The Elks National Veterans Service Commission was established, with the goal of serving hospitalized veterans. In 1948, the Elks founded The Veterans Leather Program providing free wheelchair gloves and rehabilitation materials to veterans.

A plea for help from the Secretary of Defense in 1951 resulted in the Elks helping to collect over half a million pints of blood. In 1955, The Elks joined the Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service Executive Committee, and hundreds of Elks begin to volunteer at VA facilities. In 1997, the Elks again partnered with the VA to support adaptive sports events to help recovering veterans and veterans with disabilities stay healthy and active. The ENVSC began to offer freedom grants to help lodges serve veterans and military members in need in their communities in 1911 And in 2016, the Elks launched the Welcome Home program to help end veteran homelessness

Today, Elks volunteers provide direct service to veterans in more than 330 facilities each month. Through our grants to Elks lodges,



In 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history and after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans" making the 11th of November a day to honor American veterans of all wars. Later that same year, on October 8, President Dwight D. Eisenhower, himself a member of the Benevolent and Protective order of Elks, issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation."

we connect with veterans and military members in their communities, providing them with services where they live. We help veterans rehabilitate and thrive through adaptive sports programs and therapy kits. And our Welcome Home initiative is reaching out to some of our most vulnerable veterans: those who are experiencing homelessness

In our lodge, our veterans committee has become more active and is engaging with veterans in our community. Post-COVID, we are again visiting the VA Hospital, planning a Thanksgiving meal, and hosting a Stand-Down resource day event in partnership with Operation Warm Wishes on Veterans Day to provide haircuts, care kits and health screenings. We're also working to secure over 900 wreaths to lay at every gravesite in the Santa Ana Cemetery in December.

We hope you will take time to reflect on what this day is for and how it came about. Take time to thank a veteran for their service and sacrifice. War time or not, a veteran was willing to make the ultimate sacrifice if necessary and it should always be appreciated and respected.

One way you can show your appreciation is to make a \$17 donation to our Wreaths Across America project. This will help us to place a wreath at every veteran's gravesite on December 16. There are over 900 veterans buried at the Santa Ana Cemetery. You can donate through a link at www.saelks.com.




